## Collection Information

Abstract : This collection is comprised of postcards that are connected to the Nazi Party in Germany. The Nazi Party, officially the National Socialist German Workers' Party (German: *Nationalsozialistische Deutsche Arbeiterpartei* or NSDAP), was a political party in Germany active between 1920 and 1945 that created and supported the ideology of Nazism. Its precursor, the German Workers' Party (*Deutsche Arbeiterpartei*; DAP), existed from 1919 to 1920. The Nazi Party emerged from the extremist German nationalist, racist and populist *Freikorps* paramilitary culture, which fought against the communist uprisings in post-World War I Germany. The party was created to draw workers away from communism and into *völkisch* nationalism. Initially, Nazi political strategy focused on anti-big business, anti-bourgeois, and anti-capitalist rhetoric. This was later downplayed to gain the support of business leaders, and in the 1930s the party's main focus shifted to anti-Semitic and anti-Marxist themes. Following the Nazi seizure of power in 1933, Hitler established a Reich Ministry of Public Enlightenment and Propaganda headed by Joseph Goebbels. The Ministry's aim was to ensure that the Nazi message was successfully communicated through art, music, theater, films, books, radio, educational materials, and the press. Postcards were an extension of the propaganda department to boost morale, glorify their military and political heroes, and commemorate special events and anniversaries. Postcards were easier to disseminate than posters and political cartoons and the Nazi government saw in postcards a way to use visual imagery that could express opinions and rally citizens around common causes inexpensively and effectively.

Postcards were printed and sold throughout Germany and German-occupied territories. The postcards offered an affordable way to stay in contact with family and friends in an era before wide access to mass communication, and this common form of communication became interwoven with images of Hitler and party symbols. The postcards show the massive popularity that Hitler enjoyed in Germany during this era. Nazi propaganda often used Hitler's image, building a myth of his supposed invincibility and charisma. The leader became associated with the nation's prosperity and was portrayed as central to its future success. Hitler's images cast him as a hero, a father figure, and a protector of Germany—and they appeared almost everywhere in Germany during the years of Nazi rule. By late 1943 the printing of postcards stopped due to extreme material shortages from the war. (*USHMM*)

## Historical/Biographical Notes

Post World War I, Germany experienced extreme economic depression lasting until the early 1930s. During this time, the National Socialist German Workers' Party, also known as the Nazi Party, was a small radical right party. It was so insignificant that in the Reichstag (parliament) elections of May 2, 1928, the Nazis received only 2.6 percent of the national vote. As a result of the election, the Weimar Republic continued to govern, attempting to uphold the "Grand Coalition" of Germany's Social Democratic, Catholic Center, German Democratic, and German People's parties. The Weimar Republic attempted to ensure that Germans had a voice in government that they previously did not have. The Weimar government attempted to negotiate its debts to the successors of WWI and bring stability back to the economy. Regardless of their efforts, the German economy was failing, especially during the three-year period between 1930-1933. It worsened as the worldwide economic depression intensified, with most people out of employment. The Weimar government took on the burden of the depression, with most Germans the coalition as incompetent. The coalition's failure and the worsening of German society's political, economic, and social structure created an arena for extremist groups to gain recognition, Nazi Party being the victor in 1933.

Adolf Hitler was born on 20 April 1889 in Braunau am Inn, a town in Austria-Hungary (in present-day Austria), close to the border with the German Empire. He was the fourth of six children born to Alois Hitler and his third wife, Klara Pölzl. When Hitler was three, the family moved to Passau, German.

In August 1914, at the outbreak of World War I, Hitler was living in München and voluntarily enlisted in the Bavarian Army. Posted to the Bavarian Reserve Infantry Regiment 16 (1st Company of the List Regiment), he served as a dispatch runner on the Western Front in France and Belgium, spending nearly half his time at the regimental headquarters in Fournes-en-Weppes, well behind the front lines. He was decorated for bravery, receiving the Iron Cross, Second Class, in 1914. On a recommendation by Lieutenant Hugo Gutmann, Hitler's Jewish superior, he received the Iron Cross, First Class on 4 August 1918, a decoration rarely awarded to one of Hitler's *Gefreiter* rank. He received the Black Wound Badge on 18 May 1918.

During his service at headquarters, Hitler pursued his artwork, drawing cartoons and instructions for an army newspaper. During the Battle of the Somme in October 1916, he was wounded in the left thigh when a shell exploded in the dispatch runners' dugout. Hitler spent almost two months in hospital at Beelitz, returning to his regiment on 5 March 1917. On 15 October 1918, he was temporarily blinded in a mustard gas attack and was hospitalized in Pasewalk. While there, Hitler learned of Germany's defeat, and – by his own account – upon receiving this news, he suffered a second bout of blindness.

Hitler described the war as "the greatest of all experiences", and was praised by his commanding officers for his bravery. His wartime experience reinforced his German patriotism and he was shocked by Germany's capitulation in November 1918. His bitterness over the collapse of the war effort began to shape his ideology. Like other German nationalists, he believed the *Dolchstoßlegende* (stab-in-the-back myth), which claimed that the German army, "undefeated in

the field", had been "stabbed in the back" on the home front by civilian leaders, Jews, Marxists, and those who signed the armistice that ended the fighting – later dubbed the "November criminals"

Hitler's fight to gain power started long before 1933. After World War I, Hitler returned to München. Without formal education or career prospects, he remained in the army. In July 1919 he was appointed *Verbindungsmann* (intelligence agent) of an *Aufklärungskommando* (reconnaissance unit) of the *Reichswehr*, assigned to influence other soldiers and to infiltrate the German Workers' Party (DAP). At a DAP meeting on 12 September 1919, Party Chairman Anton Drexler was impressed with Hitler's oratorical skills. He gave him a copy of his pamphlet *My Political Awakening*, which contained anti-Semitic, nationalist, anti-capitalist, and anti-Marxist ideas. On the orders of his army superiors, Hitler applied to join the party, and within a week was accepted as party member 555.

At the DAP, Hitler met Dietrich Eckart, one of the party's founders and a member of the occult Thule Society. Eckart became Hitler's mentor, exchanging ideas with him and introducing him to a wide range of München society.<sup>[93]</sup> To increase its appeal, the DAP changed its name to the *Nationalsozialistische Deutsche Arbeiterpartei* (National Socialist German Workers' Party (NSDAP), known colloquially as the "Nazi Party"). Hitler designed the party's banner of a swastika in a white circle on a red background.

Hitler was discharged from the army on 31 March 1920 and began working full-time for the party. The party headquarters was in München, a hotbed of anti-government German nationalists determined to crush Marxism and undermine the Weimar Republic. In June 1921, while Hitler and Eckart were on a fundraising trip to Berlin, a mutiny broke out within the Nazi Party in München. Members of its executive committee wanted to merge with the Nürnberg-based German Socialist Party (DSP). Hitler returned to München on 11 July and angrily tendered his resignation. The committee members realized that the resignation of their leading public figure and speaker would mean the end of the party. Hitler announced he would rejoin on the condition that he would replace Drexler as party chairman, and that the party headquarters would remain in München. The committee agreed, and he rejoined the party on 26 July as member 3,680. Hitler continued to face some opposition within the Nazi Party. Opponents of Hitler in the leadership had Hermann Esser expelled from the party, and they printed 3,000 copies of a pamphlet attacking Hitler as a traitor to the party. In the following days, Hitler spoke to several packed houses and defended himself and Esser, to thunderous applause. His strategy proved successful, and at a special party congress on 29 July, he was granted absolute powers as party chairman, replacing Drexler, by a vote of 533 to 1.

In 1923, Hitler enlisted the help of World War I General Erich Ludendorff for an attempted coup known as the "Beer Hall Putsch". The Nazi Party used Italian Fascism as a model for their appearance and policies. Hitler wanted to emulate Benito Mussolini's "March on Rome" of 1922 by staging his own coup in Bavaria, to be followed by a challenge to the government in Berlin. Hitler and Ludendorff sought the support of *Staatskommissar* (State Commissioner) Gustav Ritter von Kahr, Bavaria's *de facto* ruler. However, Kahr, along with Police Chief Hans Ritter von Seisser and Reichswehr General Otto von Lossow, wanted to install a nationalist dictatorship without Hitler. On 8 November 1923, Hitler and the SA stormed a public meeting of 3,000



people organized by Kahr in the Bürgerbräukeller, a beer hall in München. Interrupting Kahr's speech, he announced that the national revolution had begun and declared the formation of a new government with Ludendorff. Hitler's forces initially succeeded in occupying the local Reichswehr and police headquarters, but Kahr and his cohorts quickly withdrew their support. Neither the army, nor the state police, joined forces with Hitler. The next day, Hitler and his followers marched from the beer hall to the Bavarian War Ministry to overthrow the Bavarian government, but police dispersed them. Sixteen Nazi Party members and four police officers were killed in the failed coup.

He was arrested on 11 November 1923 for high treason. His trial before the special People's Court in München began in February 1924, and Alfred Rosenberg became temporary leader of the Nazi Party. On 1 April, Hitler was sentenced to five years' imprisonment at Landsberg Prison. There, he received friendly treatment from the guards, and was allowed mail from supporters and regular visits by party comrades. Pardoned by the Bavarian Supreme Court, he was released from jail on 20 December 1924, against the state prosecutor's objections. Including time on remand, Hitler served just over one year in prison.

While at Landsberg, Hitler dictated most of the first volume of *Mein Kampf* (*My Struggle*; originally entitled *Four and a Half Years of Struggle against Lies, Stupidity, and Cowardice*) at first to his chauffeur, Emil Maurice, and then to his deputy, Rudolf Hess. The book, dedicated to Thule Society member Dietrich Eckart, was an autobiography and exposition of his ideology. The book laid out Hitler's plans for transforming German society into one based on race. Throughout the book, Jews are equated with "germs" and presented as the "international poisoners" of society. According to Hitler's ideology, the only solution was their extermination.

The Great Depression provided a political opportunity for Hitler. Hitler ran against Hindenburg in the 1932 presidential elections. A speech to the Industry Club in Düsseldorf on 27 January 1932 won him support from many of Germany's most powerful industrialists. Hindenburg had support from various nationalist, monarchist, Catholic, and republican parties, and some Social Democrats. Hitler used the campaign slogan "*Hitler über Deutschland*" ("Hitler over Germany"), a reference to his political ambitions and his campaigning by aircraft.<sup>[150]</sup> He was one of the first politicians to use aircraft travel for political purposes, and used it effectively. Hitler came in second in both rounds of the election, garnering more than 35 per cent of the vote in the final election. Although he lost to Hindenburg, this election established Hitler as a strong force in German politics.

The absence of an effective government prompted two influential politicians, Franz von Papen and Alfred Hugenberg, along with several other industrialists and businessmen, to write a letter to Hindenburg. The signers urged Hindenburg to appoint Hitler as leader of a government "independent from parliamentary parties", which could turn into a movement that would "enrapture millions of people".

Hindenburg reluctantly agreed to appoint Hitler as chancellor after two further parliamentary elections – in July and November 1932 – had not resulted in the formation of a majority government. Hitler headed a short-lived coalition government formed by the Nazi Party (which had the most seats in the Reichstag) and Hugenberg's party, the German National People's Party

(DNVP). On 30 January 1933, the new cabinet was sworn in during a brief ceremony in Hindenburg's office. The Nazi Party gained three posts: Hitler was named chancellor, Wilhelm Frick Minister of the Interior, and Hermann Göring Minister of the Interior for Prussia. Hitler had insisted on the ministerial positions as a way to gain control over the police in much of Germany.

As chancellor, Hitler worked against attempts by the Nazi Party's opponents to build a majority government. Because of the political stalemate, he asked Hindenburg to again dissolve the Reichstag, and elections were scheduled for early March. On 27 February 1933, the Reichstag building was set on fire. At Hitler's urging, Hindenburg responded by signing the Reichstag Fire Decree of 28 February, drafted by the Nazis, which suspended basic rights and allowed detention without trial. The decree was permitted under Article 48 of the Weimar Constitution, which gave the president the power to take emergency measures to protect public safety and order. In addition to political campaigning, the Nazi Party engaged in paramilitary violence and the spread of anti-communist propaganda in the days preceding the election. On election day, 6 March 1933, the Nazi Party's share of the vote increased to 43.9 per cent, and the party acquired the largest number of seats in parliament. Hitler's party failed to secure an absolute majority, necessitating another coalition with the DNVP.

On 21 March 1933, the new Reichstag was constituted with an opening ceremony at the Garrison Church in Potsdam. This "Day of Potsdam" was held to demonstrate unity between the Nazi movement and the old Prussian elite and military. Hitler appeared in a morning coat and humbly greeted Hindenburg.

To achieve full political control despite not having an absolute majority in parliament, Hitler's government brought the *Ermächtigungsgesetz* (Enabling Act) to a vote in the newly elected Reichstag. The Act – officially titled the *Gesetz zur Behebung der Not von Volk und Reich* ("Law to Remedy the Distress of People and Reich") – gave Hitler's cabinet the power to enact laws without the consent of the Reichstag for four years. These laws could (with certain exceptions) deviate from the constitution.<sup>[167]</sup> Since it would affect the constitution, the Enabling Act required a two-thirds majority to pass. Leaving nothing to chance, the Nazis used the provisions of the Reichstag Fire Decree to arrest all 81 Communist deputies (in spite of their virulent campaign against the party, the Nazis had allowed the KPD to contest the election) and prevent several Social Democrats from attending.

On 23 March 1933, the Reichstag assembled at the Kroll Opera House under turbulent circumstances. Ranks of SA men served as guards inside the building, while large groups outside opposing the proposed legislation shouted slogans and threats towards the arriving members of parliament. After Hitler verbally promised Centre party leader Ludwig Kaas that Hindenburg would retain his power of veto, Kaas announced the Centre Party would support the Enabling Act. The Act passed by a vote of 444–94, with all parties except the Social Democrats voting in favour. The Enabling Act, along with the Reichstag Fire Decree, transformed Hitler's government into a de facto legal dictatorship

Having achieved full control over the legislative and executive branches of government, Hitler and his allies began to suppress the remaining opposition. The Social Democratic Party was

banned and its assets seized. While many trade union delegates were in Berlin for May Day activities, SA stormtroopers occupied union offices around the country. On 2 May 1933, all trade unions were forced to dissolve and their leaders were arrested. Some were sent to concentration camps. The German Labour Front was formed as an umbrella organization to represent all workers, administrators, and company owners, thus reflecting the concept of Nazism in the spirit of Hitler's *Volksgemeinschaft* ("people's community").

By the end of June, the other parties had been intimidated into disbanding. This included the Nazis' nominal coalition partner, the DNVP; with the SA's help, Hitler forced its leader, Hugenberg, to resign on 29 June. On 14 July 1933, the Nazi Party was declared the only legal political party in Germany. The demands of the SA for more political and military power caused anxiety among military, industrial, and political leaders. In response, Hitler purged the entire SA leadership in the Night of the Long Knives, which took place from 30 June to 2 July 1934. Hitler targeted Ernst Röhm and other SA leaders who, along with a number of Hitler's political adversaries (such as Gregor Strasser and former chancellor Kurt von Schleicher), were rounded up, arrested, and shot. While the international community and some Germans were shocked by the murders, many in Germany believed Hitler was restoring order.

On 2 August 1934, Hindenburg died. The previous day, the cabinet had enacted the "Law Concerning the Highest State Office of the Reich". This law stated that upon Hindenburg's death, the office of president would be abolished and its powers merged with those of the chancellor. Hitler thus became head of state as well as head of government, and was formally named as *Führer und Reichskanzler* (leader and chancellor), although *Reichskanzler* was eventually quietly dropped. With this action, Hitler eliminated the last legal remedy by which he could be removed from office.

As head of state, Hitler became commander-in-chief of the armed forces. Immediately after Hindenburg's death, at the instigation of the leadership of the *Reichswehr*, the traditional loyalty oath of soldiers was altered to affirm loyalty to Hitler personally, by name, rather than to the office of commander-in-chief (which was later renamed to supreme commander) or the state. On 19 August, the merger of the presidency with the chancellorship was approved by 88 per cent of the electorate voting in a plebiscite.

In August 1934, Hitler appointed *Reichsbank* President Hjalmar Schacht as Minister of Economics, and in the following year, as Plenipotentiary for War Economy in charge of preparing the economy for war. Reconstruction and rearmament were financed through Mefo bills, printing money, and seizing the assets of people arrested as enemies of the State, including Jews. Unemployment fell from six million in 1932 to one million in 1936. Hitler oversaw one of the largest infrastructure improvement campaigns in German history, leading to the construction of dams, autobahns, railroads, and other civil works. Wages were slightly lower in the mid to late 1930s compared with wages during the Weimar Republic, while the cost of living increased by 25 per cent. The average work week increased during the shift to a war economy; by 1939, the average German was working between 47 and 50 hours a week.

Hitler's government sponsored architecture on an immense scale. Albert Speer, instrumental in implementing Hitler's classicist reinterpretation of German culture, was placed in charge of the

proposed architectural renovations of Berlin. Despite a threatened multi-nation boycott, Germany hosted the 1936 Olympic Games. Hitler officiated at the opening ceremonies and attended events at both the Winter Games in Garmisch-Partenkirchen and the Summer Games in Berlin.

On 12 March 1938, Hitler announced the unification of Austria with Nazi Germany in the *Anschluss*. Hitler then turned his attention to the ethnic German population of the Sudetenland region of Czechoslovakia. In April Hitler ordered the OKW to prepare for *Fall Grün* (Case Green), the code name for an invasion of Czechoslovakia. As a result of intense French and British diplomatic pressure, on 5 September Czechoslovakian President Edvard Beneš unveiled the "Fourth Plan" for constitutional reorganization of his country, which agreed to most of Henlein's demands for Sudeten autonomy. Henlein's party responded to Beneš' offer by instigating a series of violent clashes with the Czechoslovakian police that led to the declaration of martial law in certain Sudeten districts.

Germany was dependent on imported oil; a confrontation with Britain over the Czechoslovakian dispute could curtail Germany's oil supplies. This forced Hitler to call off *Fall Grün*, originally planned for 1 October 1938. On 29 September Hitler, Neville Chamberlain, Édouard Daladier, and Mussolini attended a one-day conference in München that led to the München Agreement, which handed over the Sudetenland districts to Germany.

Chamberlain was satisfied with the München conference, calling the outcome "peace for our time", while Hitler was angered about the missed opportunity for war in 1938. Hitler was selected *Time* magazine's Man of the Year for 1938.

On 14 March 1939, under threat from Hungary, Slovakia declared independence and received protection from Germany. The next day, in violation of the München accord and possibly as a result of the deepening economic crisis requiring additional assets, Hitler ordered the Wehrmacht to invade the Czech rump state, and from Prague Castle he proclaimed the territory a German protectorate.

In private discussions in 1939, Hitler declared Britain the main enemy to be defeated and that Poland's obliteration was a necessary prelude for that goal. In a Reichstag speech on 28 April, he renounced both the Anglo-German Naval Agreement and the German–Polish Non-Aggression Pact. Hitler was concerned that a military attack against Poland could result in a premature war with Britain. Hitler's foreign minister and former Ambassador to London, Joachim von Ribbentrop, assured him that neither Britain nor France would honour their commitments to Poland. Accordingly, on 22 August 1939 Hitler ordered a military mobilization against Poland.

On 1 September 1939, Germany invaded western Poland under the pretext of having been denied claims to the Free City of Danzig and the right to extraterritorial roads across the Polish Corridor, which Germany had ceded under the Versailles Treaty. In response, Britain and France declared war on Germany on 3 September.

By late 1944, both the Red Army and the Western Allies were advancing into Germany. With much of Germany in ruins in January 1945, Hitler ordered the destruction of all German industrial infrastructure before it could fall into Allied hands. Minister for Armaments Albert

Speer was entrusted with executing this scorched earth policy, but he secretly disobeyed the order.

On 20 April, his 56th birthday, Hitler made his last trip from the *Führerbunker* (Führer's shelter) to the surface. In the ruined garden of the Reich Chancellery, he awarded Iron Crosses to boy soldiers of the Hitler Youth, who were now fighting the Red Army at the front near Berlin.

On 30 April 1945, Soviet troops were within a block or two of the Reich Chancellery when Hitler shot himself in the head and Braun bit into a cyanide capsule. Berlin surrendered on 2 May. (*Source Wikipedia*)

## Scope and Content

Studies have identified three distinct categories of postcards created during the Third Reich. The “Official Issue” were available at all post offices or at special counters at exhibitions. They are the most common and the postage stamps are imprinted. Cards with a double border and separate stamp indicates “Official Postal Stationery” with imprinted stamp. The “Printed to Private Order” postcards were produced to commemorate special events and the postage stamp is also imprinted. Cards without the double border, but with separately illustrated stamp indicate “Printed to Private Order” postcards with imprinted stamps. The third category is that of “propaganda” postcards. These are the most colorful and generally political in nature. They required a postage stamp. (*Roger James Bender*)

When entering the postcards into the finding aid, it was noted whether the postcards were used or unused. If the postcard was used it was further clarified by whether it was 1) used with writing, 2) used with just stamp attached, or 3) used with stamp attached and postmarked. It was also noted if the postcard was printed in color or not. Each postcard was photographed (back of postcard was also photographed if stamp affixed and/or postmarked). An attempt was made to translate printed parts of the postcards and translations were included in the finding aid. Many of the used postcards with handwritten messages could not be transcribed.

**It should be noted that as extensive as our search was to try and properly identify each postcard, we realize mistakes are possible and would welcome contact from collectors and scholars in the field.**

## Series Descriptions

Series 1: This series is the cigarette tobacco cards which is the tradition of limited edition collectable cards sold in cigarette cartons. They became extremely popular during World War II among young Germans. It was manufactured in Dresden and Berlin by Cigarettenfabrik Constantine.

Series 2: This series is related to sports events. The first subseries covers the Winter and Summer Olympics in 1936. The second subseries covers miscellaneous sports which include; gymnastics, ice skating, SA competitions and more.

Series 3: This series includes postcards advertising various scenic locations, cities and towns within Germany. Subseries one includes several series of "Get to Know Germany" postcards. Subseries 2 includes various views of München, subseries 3 various views of Berlin and then a miscellaneous series.

Series 4: This series contains postcards relating to the commemoration of miscellaneous events within Germany. Events include; Harvest Day, May Day, 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Berlin and many postcards commemoration miscellaneous exhibitions.

Series 5: This series contains postcards relating the stamp and stamp collecting. It includes cards from the annual "Day of the Stamp," and Philatelic Associations events.

Series 6: This series contains postcards related to Artwork and art museums in Germany.

Series 7: This series contains Red Cross related postcards (Fundraising, etc.)

Series 8: This series contains postcards relating to miscellaneous fundraisers. Included in the series are fundraisers related to German Emergency Aid, War Bonds, Winterhilfswerk (Winter Relief of the German People: an annual donation drive by the National Socialist People's Welfare to help fund charitable work.

Series 9: This series contains miscellaneous postcards that include songs and poems.

Series 10: This series contains postcards related to the Nazi Party. Subseries 1 includes those related to the NSDAP. Subseries 2 relates to the various Gaue (main administrative divisions of Nazi Germany. Subseries 3 relates to images of Nazi party government officials. Subseries 4 – 8 relate to the Reichsparteitages held in Nürnberg. Subseries include official, commemorating, miscellaneous, and undated postcards. Subseries 9 related to Hitler Youth.

Series 11: This series contains postcards relating to the Nazi military. Subseries 1 includes portraits of military officials, Subseries 2 relate to the commemoration of Armed Forces Day, Subseries 3 commemorate the return of the "Legion Condor" from the Spanish Civil War (1936 – 1939). Subseries 4 are various examples of "Feldpost" used by German soldiers to write home to their families and the final Subseries 5 contains miscellaneous military postcards.

Series 12: This series contains postcards that displays various aspects of Adolf Hitler's life. The first Subseries is composed of postcards that commemorate Hitler's rise to power. Subseries 2 are postcards of state visits and visitors, Subseries 3 is of Hitler's Birthday, Subseries 4 are pictures of Hitler's Residences, Subseries 5 are group images of Hitler, Subseries 6 are solo images of Hitler and the final Subseries 7 are sketches of Adolf Hitler.

Series 13: This series is called *Italian Postcards* which are postcards that are written in Italian or have some connection to Italy.

Series 14: This series consists of miscellaneous postcards that did not fit into any category. The content varies from postcards of world leaders to Nazi posters.

Series 15: This series is made up of two booklets. One is a calendar and the other is a catalog of German art exhibition.
