This course is an introduction to German cinema. Students will study masterpieces of German cinema, important critical discussions of them, and the contexts in which they arose.

Short papers:

- The first short paper will be a response to Siegfried Kracauer's critical masterpiece, From Caligari to Hitler. Give an assessment of his analysis. 4-5 pages. Due Mar 1.
- The second short paper will be an annotated bibliography of one of the films we have watched in the first half of the semester. Find at least 5 scholarly critical essays (in film journals, booklength collections of essays, etc.; make sure that internet essays are of a scholarly nature) on the film, read them, and briefly indicate their main points and your assessment of them. "Lola and Billy the Kid," "Aimee and Jaguar," "I Am My Own Woman," and "Run Lola Run" are probably so recent that there is not enough critical literature available on them, so you will have to select another film. Due Mar. 19.

<u>Final internet project:</u> This will be an exhibit about a particular film in the virtual museum, which you will create collaboratively with students from other institutions who are also studying German film. It will be graded on creativity and thoroughness. You will present your exhibit to class in the last days of the semester. Please try to have something ready by the time we discuss the film, though, so that we can see that you are getting started.

The project will be created on "virtual museum" [http://cet.middlebury.edu/virtualmuseum/#]. On January 28, Aaron Coburn from Middlebury College will come and explain the workings of this program.

<u>Protocols</u>: for most days, there will be a student assigned to take notes. These should be written up into a report on the class by the next class section. If you want me to make copies of the protocol for the class, please have your original in to my office in Memorial at least a half an hour before class starts. Otherwise, bring enough copies for the class.

<u>Participation</u>: Discussion is vitally important to this class. Mere attendance without speaking will get you a "D," which could seriously hurt your final grade.

<u>Final examination</u>: The final examination will be a series of essay questions in which you will have the chance to compare and contrast a number of films from the pre- and postwar eras.

Attendance: Attendance is vital for a seminar class. More than three absences may result in the lowering of your final grade by a whole letter.

<u>Film Screenings</u>: Films will be shown in Olin 157 at 1:30 on Friday. If you cannot make this screening, you may watch the films at your own leisure in the library. The videos/dvds are generally not to leave the library, however, so that other students may also have access to them.

<u>Lateness</u>: Late papers complicate the grading process. Therefore, I will take off a half grade for each day of lateness. I leave the calculation up to you whether the extra work you put into a paper will be worth the grade erosion caused by lateness.
