As they fought with bullets and machines, we must fight with good-will and international cooperation. When we as individuals and a group make this world a better place for ourselves and the world, then we will have made real history. And as time passes on, we should all remember that we in our own lives, are traveling on that level of time to that undiscovered country, from whose borne, no traveler returns.

"Inventory"

A date never to be forgotten, August 8th, 1945—the first atomic bomb thundered upon the city of Hiroshima. The inhabitants of this planet were introduced to the age of Atomic Energy. The physical and mental impacts were cataclysmic. Only a small part of the hidden potentialities of the universe had been unleashed upon humanity; man marvelled, gasped, and fearfully trembled at his own ingenious contrivance. When he became conscious with the realization of what he had done, the full meaning and significance struck him dumbfounded. Fear possessed his entire being. He naturally and feverishly sought an explanation and attempted to reconcile himself to the precious milk he had spilled.

Through his tears, he saw himself dimly reflected in the mirror of Time and Progress. What did he see? The reflection slowly became clearer as the tears dried into ice-cold stains upon a bloody countenance. He saw the achievements of his past fifty years. This was sufficient. There was no need to look beyond that short span. During that time, man had progressed, this was certain. But what kind of progress had he made? In half a century there had occurred the highest degree of acceleration in the development of natural science and technological marvels. With that progress had continued a parallel evolution in the rise from his primitive condition to a so-called civilized one. Yet, the blood of centuries still clung to his hands; the torture and agony of his soul, imprinted upon his face. At first he could not understand, but through profound insight, he saw the statistical graph of his humanitarian and moral progress. It was on the downward trend and plunging straight in the direction to which he was inescapably doomed. In the gory pages of that fraction of his history, he read with amazement and horror these startling revelations.

Since 1887, the world had scarcely known a year without warfare, armed revolt, massacre, pogrom and other ingenious forms of slaughter. This so-called age of enlightenment had produced two infernal world wars, innumerable minor wars in every corner of the earth, wholesale brutalities from the most innocently accidental to the most viciously pre-meditated. Dr. Howard Mumford Jones says, "Mankind had been nourished on an uninterrupted diet of blood." Taking a sum total of these barbarities, it was discovered that they put to shame all of those which had transpired before 1887, going all the way back to the transitory period when man evolved into a civilized being. The abominable aspects of this miserable account were the new techniques he had employed and, what is more tragic, the state of mind he had developed as a result of those techniques which spurred him on with a more furious passion. What had happened?

Evil had dominated Good. Evil had won from Good the monopoly over the neutral instrument of technology. That odious power was now at the helm and the dignity of man was crumbling. Paradoxical as it may seem, this technology was a product of education. Some men were forced to indict education as a cohort and an ally of Evil, and this, to a certain degree, could not be denied. Mark Twain has commented sardonically, "No brute ever does a cruel thing. That is the monopoly of those with a Moral Sense." Profound thinking men, scientists, philosophers, educators, theologians, suddenly became aware of the high tension of the problem and sought to offer various solutions which might be summarized as follows: Education should now be injected with emphasis upon making the individual conscious of his moral obliga-

tions to his fellow man above and beyond the limits of himself. This was an urgent necessity for the times. This, if some day can ever be realized, will be the theory whereby to teach and train men for their proper places in society. Many methods of the practical application of this general program have been advanced. One of the loftiest of these has been set forth by our own President Jefferson: that is, the development of the Science of Good and Evil. Only through a profound and detailed study of these two great forces will we be better able to understand the relationship between them, the causes and effects, in order to bring about eventually the elimination of Evil, or, if that is not possible, at least the shackling of it in some escape-proof enclosure.

We have fallen heir to this horrible heritage. How are we to enter and rearrange this disordered house called Earth? We are thinking beings? That was the underlying purpose of going to college, to make us so. It would be a sorry tragedy to find that this purpose had not been attained in the least among us. If there be such in our midst, not only here but among college graduates everywhere, let him crawl into some dark corner and die for he is but a stumbling block on the high road to our aspired goal.

We can start by taking an inventory of ourselves. Being egotistical we find that we are not only composites of chemical substances, but are endowed with a marvelous enigmatic mechanism called Mind which is the great element that distinguishes us from other forms of life. With that mechanism we are able to attain infinite heights in the process of thinking. With it we can closely examine the two powerful forces of Good and Evil making us aware of our good and bad achievements. In it have germinated the various philosophies of life. At different periods in the history of mankind, the human mind, inspired by some incomprehensible force, has initiated great programs of living adjusted to the times, environment, and circumstances.

A new age has now dawned. This atomic era challenges us to adopt not a new but an old philosophy of living which has been moulding with the years. This, would be a return to the struggle for the attainment of man's moral perfection. The example, the ideal goal, the standard was established for us two thousand years ago. Granting that that perfection can never be realized in ordinary man, nevertheless it behooves us to strive for it. This will quickly be condemned as idealistic nonsense which seemingly has no place in our realistic world. Look deeply and you will see that it is an absolute necessity for our times and conditions. If you look again you will find that this so-called idealism is in actuality the most realistic attitude we can adopt. If we can aspire for moral perfection, through adherence to the basic ethical principles set forth by the great religions of men, we will find that our relation with the rest of mankind will become facilitated and happier, insuring a more promising world in which to live. We need not be ashamed of facing the world intent upon the development of the beautiful quality of altruism! Let us think in terms of universal citizenship instead of just American, as much as we may cherish our own. The question always arises, how can we be sure of the cooperation of others? Unfortunately we cannot, but we should at least try such a way of life. The long run results must inevitably be successful if we are the dignified human beings we claim to be. For it is certain that if we continue for another period of fifty years living the kind of tragedy we have experienced the past fifty years, with its proportional intensification, there is no possible hope for the existence of human civilization.

Most of us are destined for a half century more of life. Within our life span will transpire the crucial test deciding whether mankind shall walk in majesty or sink to the depths of degradation.

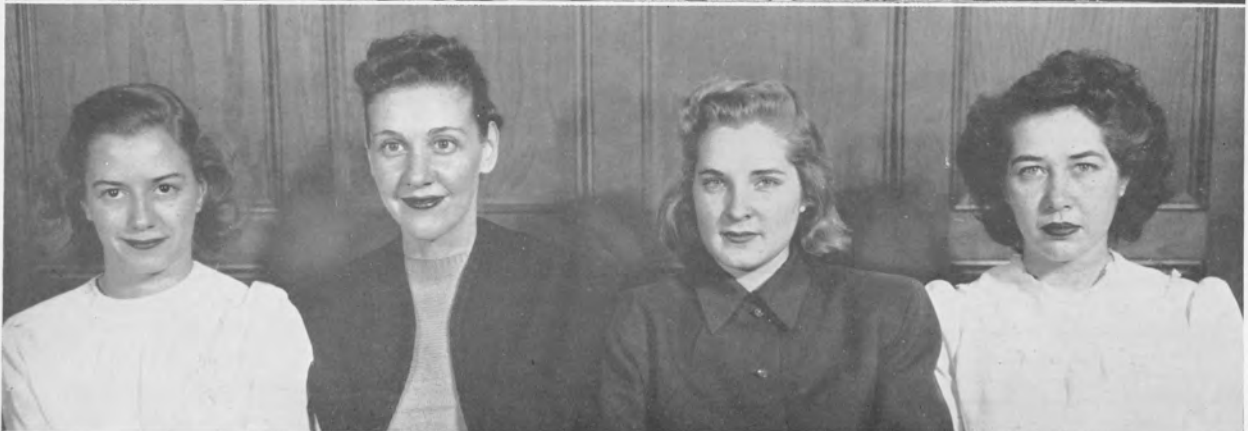

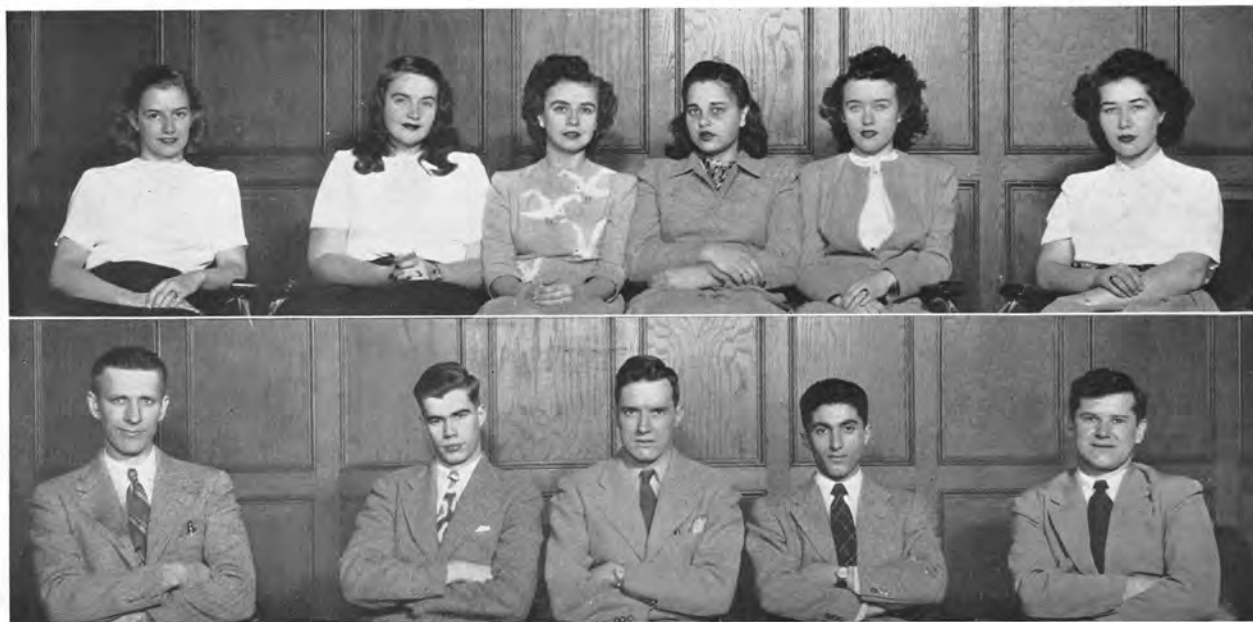

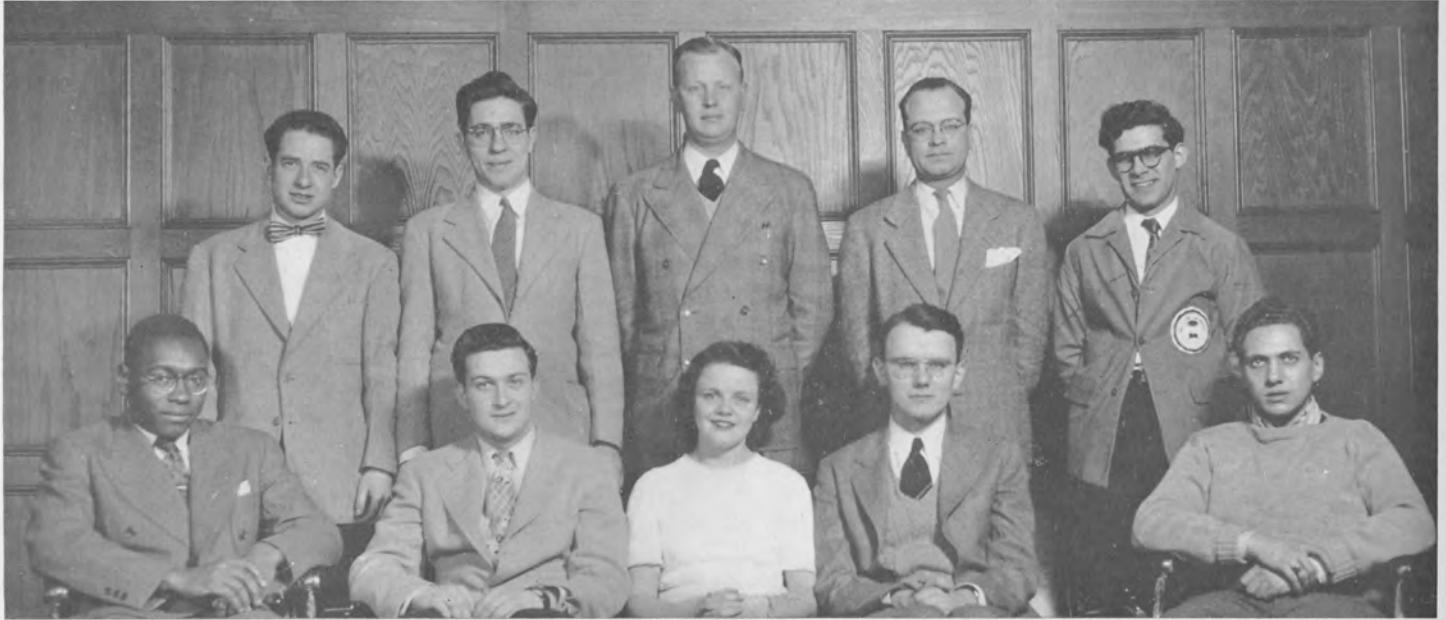
